


Stories Our Neighbors Tell: Four Shows about Justice


by Milbre Burch Kind Crone Productions, www.kindcrone.com A USB drive (both audio and video) suitable for adults and teens that includes four of Burch's live performances: -- Tales from Beyond the Ban: Folktales from Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Syria, Sudan, and Yemen, a 75-minute show at the Raleigh-based virtual Women's Theatre Festival Fringe. --Sometimes I Sing, a 38-minute original character monologue (set in 1901) about domestic violence. --Changing Skins: Tales about Gender, Identity, and Humanity, a 75-minute show showcasing the wealth and persistence of transgender folktales and folkways around the world, and also includes other non-heteronormative folktales, plus science, sociology, and commentary about gender identity and expression. --Lucille Says, a 35-minute monologue written by Burch for the virtual Remembrance and Renewal storytelling festival.

When steel ruled the "rust belt" of America, and clouds of smoke lay thick over its valleys and towns, a giant's footsteps could be heard echoing through the dusty streets. Tim brings to life the powerful legend of Joe Majarac with the standards of heroism, self-sacrifice, and loyalty that Joe personified. (Joe Majarac was to the steel industry what John Henry was to the railroads.) This was designed as a historybased program for grades K-6.



Tree with Golden Apples: Botanical and Agricultural Wisdom in World Myth

Based on the wisdom of the chlorophyll molecule, which has twelve points, this book is filled with twelve myths from world cultures revealing both the beauty and truth offered by the plant kingdom—by Nature. Each myth is followed by a short scientific vignette and is aided by short explorations of the storyteller's art that can enhance sharing and telling. Two additional anecdotes demonstrate how archetypes can be observed moving through our personal experiences and are not exclusively the domain of myth and science.



Folk Tales of the Cosmos by Janet Dowling



planting, navigating, preparing for winter, and knowing when the beasts migrate across the plains.




Earthsong: A Celebration of Mother Earth, by Heather Forest

Forest's musical compositions and storytelling take listeners through the cosmological, geological, and anthropological history of life on Earth. Spiced with both science and whimsical humor, it celebrates Mother Earth, inspires reverence for the web of life, and encourages planetary citizenship.




Sky Lore & Other Folktales, by Milbre Burch Kind Crone Productions, <u>www.kindcrone.com</u>

A collection of Burch's retellings of oral tales in USB drive (audio) format, suitable for elementaryschool-age children through adults. The first group includes an introduction and eight folktales (from Japan, Brazil, China, Botswana, Ukraine, Turkey, West Africa, and Estonia), and provides folkloric explanations of the presence of clouds, stars, solar and lunar eclipses, the moon's sheen and its placement in the sky, the rising of the sun, and the origin of the Milky Way. (Lesson plans are included.) The second group is an assortment of tales from Taiwan, Brittany (France), Haiti, the US, and Turkey.





Haunted by Dickens by Tim Lowry Amazon, <u>https://a.co/d/3tJH2iW</u>


Humorous asides and personal insight into the themes of Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol*. From ghosts and geezers to hope for all humanity, this is the most iconic holiday story ever told. In a mere 30,000 words or so, Dickens' characters are at their best and worst during the merriest of seasons. Lowry has performed this over 150 times (more than

Dickens himself), and he shares an abundance of information about his performance experiences and about the story itself.




World Tales for Family Storytelling III by Chris Smith



Unlocking Your Life's Wisdom: Stories Are the Keys



Three Hens, a Peacock, and the Enormous Egg





This resource is composed of four unique versions of the classic Grimm's fairytale *Rapunzel* reimagined as story, song, and poetry. The USB drive, accessible in cars or on computers, contains a 56-minute virtual video concert, an audio track, and a commentary and bibliography by the artists. The commentary provides a backstage look at three experienced artists' processes, and it offers practical insights into revisioning classic stories for contemporary listeners.




Animals: Personal Tales of Encounters with Spirit Animals



The incredible true story of Tom Crean as he and his crew explored the Antarctic. His heroic acts of courage, perseverance, and teamwork are mindboggling.





into tellable stories. The narratives encompass the work of many dedicated historians who strived to offer accurate information about these extremely unusual women.






